

First Conditional

The first conditional is used to talk about real and possible situations in the future. It describes things that are likely to happen if a certain condition is met.

If (+) Simple Present, will (+) infinitive

Uses:

1. Possible Future Events:

To talk about actions or events that might happen in the future.

- If I have time, I will help you with your project.
- If they arrive early, we will start the meeting.

2. Promises and Threats:

To make promises or threats about the future.

- If you work hard, you will get a promotion.
- If you don't clean your room, you won't be allowed to go out.

3. Suggestions and Advice:

To give advice or make suggestions about what might happen.

- If you feel sick, you should see a doctor.
- If it's hot tomorrow, we should go to the beach.

Examples:

1. Positive:

- If it rains, I will bring an umbrella.
- If she studies hard, she will pass the exam.

2. Negative:

- If you don't hurry, you will miss the bus.
- If they don't arrive soon, we won't wait for them.

3. Questions:

- If I call you, will you answer?
- If he invites you, will you go?



Variations:

- Imperative in the Main Clause: Sometimes the main clause can be an imperative.
 - o If you see John, tell him to call me.
 - o If you're tired, take a break.

Common Mistakes:

- 1. Using the future tense in the 'if' clause:
 - o Incorrect: If it will rain, we will cancel the picnic.
 - o Correct: If it rains, we will cancel the picnic.
- 2. Mixing first and second conditional:
 - o Incorrect: If I have time, I would help you.
 - o Correct: If I have time, I will help you.

Summary:

- The first conditional is for real and possible future situations.
- It uses the present simple in the 'if' clause and 'will' + base verb in the main clause.
- It can express predictions, promises, warnings, suggestions, or advice.

Examples to Clarify:

- **1. Prediction:** If you read this book, you will learn a lot.
- **2. Promise:** If you come to the party, I will introduce you to my friends.
- **3.** Warning: If you touch that wire, you will get a shock.
- **4. Suggestion:** If you're free this weekend, we should go hiking.

Five alternatives to 'if'

1. As long as...

As long as we go somewhere hot, I'll travel with you.

2. Suppose...

Suppose we went to America - would it be safe?

3. Unless...

Unless I get the time off work, I won't be able to go.

4. Providing / provided...

Providing I get the time off work, I'll go.

5. On (the) condition that...

On the condition that you pay me extra, I'll work over the holiday.



Conversation Using First Conditional

Context: Two friends, Alex and Sam, are discussing their plans for the weekend.

Alex : Hey Sam, do you have any plans for the weekend?

Sam : Not yet. What about you?

Alex : I was thinking, if the weather is nice, we will go hiking. Do you want to join?

Sam : That sounds great! But what if it rains?

Alex : If it rains, we will go to the new indoor climbing gym instead.

Sam : That's a good backup plan. I've been wanting to try indoor climbing. If we go there,

will you teach me some basics?

Alex : Of course! If you want, I will bring my extra gear for you to use.

Sam : Thanks, Alex. What time should we meet?

Alex : If we go hiking, let's meet at 8 AM. If we go to the climbing gym, we can meet at 10 AM.

Sam : Sounds good. If I'm running late, I will text you.

Alex : Perfect. If you need a ride, let me know. I can pick you up.

Sam : Thanks! I'll let you know by tomorrow evening. If my brother wants to come, is that okay?

Alex : Sure, the more the merrier! If he joins, we will need to bring some extra snacks and water.

Sam : Got it. I'll check with him and let you know. If we go hiking, which trail are you thinking of?

Alex : If we go, we will hike the Blue Ridge Trail. It's challenging but has amazing views.

Sam : Awesome, I'm excited! Let's hope for good weather. If it's nice, it will be a perfect day.

Alex : Definitely. I'll keep an eye on the forecast. If there are any changes, I will update you.

Sam : Great, thanks Alex. Looking forward to it!

Alex : Me too, Sam. See you this weekend!
